



How to Find Copyright-free Images for Your Next Presentation

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- When using images for a presentation, openly licensed images are your safest option. They fall into two major buckets: images in the public domain and images with open licenses.
- You can freely use Public Domain works, which are not protected by copyright and belong to the public. Currently, anything published before 1925 is in the public domain, as are works created by the federal government.
- Open licenses such as Creative Commons (CC) licenses allow copyright holders to share their rights with others (Table 1)

Finding Openly Licensed Material

With Google

1. Search your term on Google.
2. Under the search bar, click on “Settings.”
3. Click on “Advanced search.”
4. Scroll to “usage rights” at the bottom and select “Creative Commons Licenses.”

With YouTube

1. Search your term on YouTube.
2. Under the search bar, click on “Filter.”
3. Within “Features” click on “Creative Commons.”

Table 1: Creative Commons Licenses

	Attribution	Distribute, make copies, make derivatives, and use commercially.	Provide attribution to the original creator.
	Attribution-ShareAlike	Distribute, make copies, make derivatives, and use commercially.	Provide attribution to the original creator AND assign the same license if you make a derivative.
	Attribution-NonCommercial	Distribute, make copies, and make derivatives.	Provide attribution to the original creator AND not make any money off the image.
	Attribution-NonCommercial-ShareAlike	Distribute, make copies, and make derivatives.	Provide attribution to the original creator AND make no \$ off the image or derivatives AND assign the same license if you make a derivative.
	Attribution-NoDerivatives	Distribute, make copies, and use commercially.	Provide attribution to the original creator AND not make any derivatives.
	Attribution-NonCommercial-NoDerivatives	Distribute and make copies,	Provide attribution to the original creator AND make no \$ off the image AND not make any derivatives.
